Spring really has sprung!



Welcome to the Spring issue of The Kite and hopefully some much better weather. The dark sky full of rain that has enveloped us since the beginning of January really has taken its toll on the Parish. We've had numerous reports of flooding, inaccessible pathways, sodden fields and potholes galore. It seems everything around us has been affected.

Unfortunately, the March Parish Council meeting was cancelled. Rest assured though that business is still very much in hand and our to-do list of projects is being managed. As seems to be the case with much of our work, planning is taking up a huge amount of resource and time – and I hate to say it, often seems a totally fruitless task. Despite the sterling efforts of our Planning Officer, Mike Rawlins, and the Clerk, who delivered a robust objection to the building of 35 townhouses on farm land at the end of Tollgate Road, St Albans District Council voted in favour of the planning application. It now means that Colney Heath will have a third housing development to contend with – and some 300 new homes in the village!

The development by Bellway Homes, on farm land running up the side of Roestock Lane, is also unfolding. Officials and vehicles have been spotted, although the marketing flyer delivered to local residents promoting the joys of what Bellway will offer the community, leaves a lot to be desired.

Other news to report is that the Parish Council has finalised its budget expenditure for the forthcoming year. The precept, the portion of council tax collected from local residents to fund the council's planned expenditure and services, will rise slightly mainly due to the increase in fly tipping and the cost to have it removed. I will talk about this more in my annual Chair's presentation to the electorate in May where I will be very happy to answer any questions or concerns you may have.

I'm determined to put some faith in what Spring has the potential to deliver. This cover image by Councillor Nick Pettit, taken a couple of weeks ago outside St Albans Cathedral, is a good way to start. Let's all work together this year to champion the positive and the good going on in our Parish.

Roestock Hut update

Roestock Hut has historically been used for a range of community activities in the Parish. Following consultation with interested parties keen to have regular access to Roestock Hut, including Colney Heath Scouts, it has been agreed by the Parish Council to reopen the building as a Parish-managed community building. The facility, located in Colney Heath's Roestock Park, will be made available for use to local groups, organisations and individuals seeking an accessible space to stage activities, events and clubs. Its return to public use will provide an additional venue option within the Parish.

The building currently requires substantial renovation and updating to bring it back into use and councillors have been engaged for a considerable amount of time on feasibility studies, usage options and outline renovation costs. The result is the Parish Council has recently approved going to public tender for the building works.

Once completed, the Parish Council will manage and maintain the Roestock Hut. Residents and community groups interested in using the space are advised to look out for updates from the Parish Council as plans come together.

A BIG THANK YOU

Hopefully by the time *The Kite* goes to print, the results of some recent work by the Tyttenhanger Community Group, headed by Pat Slade will be coming into full bloom. Pat and her team planted two and a half thousand daffodils, tulips, crocuses and snowdrops on the verges and greens.

The MONSTER returns!

Bowmans Cross (the huge area of countryside north of the Bell roundabout up to Coursers Farm) has been re-identified by Hertsmere County Council as the 'ideal location for a sustainable new community' to help meet the future housing needs of St Albans district. The site, which will include 5,000 new homes, is akin to a new town and is being led by national developers Urban&Civic.

This project not only greatly threatens the local area in terms of sustainability, services, pollution, traffic and nature, but the overall wellbeing of people's daily lives in Colney Heath and the wider parish. At a basic everyday level, the development will bring in excess of 10,000 new vehicles to our local roads, with Colney Heath and the wider Parish bang in the middle of it all. That's a vast amount of traffic for an under resourced network already creaking with congestion and problems – and Bowmans Cross brings with it no plan to develop the existing road infrastructure! And yet this is just the tip of the iceberg with what Bowmans Cross will do to the local area in terms of population growth and the demands on services.

Three years ago, the Parish Council, local residents' associations and residents went up against the Conservative-led Hertsmere County Council and stopped Bowmans Cross. The Labour councillors who supported us are now the same ones bringing the development back! It's an act of betrayal to our community and the Parish Council will be doing everything it can to oppose Bowmans Cross. Colney Heath residents battle road flooding issues

Since the early part of 2025, residents of Roestock Gardens, Franklin Close and Roestock Lane in Colney Heath have been reporting issues of road and pavement flooding to Hertfordshire County Council. Things came to a head in early February following days of sustained rain when the pooling of water along the road became a danger to traffic and pedestrians. Residents, led by the sterling efforts of Mr John Rowland, have long complained that the drain network is carrying large amounts of silt-polluted water, which has been spilling out onto the road surface for days at a time. Residents have been pointing the finger firmly at Colney Manor, the development of some 100+ new homes still being built by Taylor Wimpey, directly behind properties at Roestock Gardens.

The development, which was originally opposed by residents and the Parish Council on a number of issues including flooding, was granted planning permission with the building of a pumping station and two overflow ponds to mitigate flooding issues. To date, the ponds remain bone dry! Following the intervention of District Councillor John Hale, indepth surveys conducted by Hertfordshire County Council on the network under Roestock Gardens and Franklin Close revealed that the drains were full of earth and silt. Pipeline camera investigations then revealed that it was being carried in water from Colney Manor. The drains have now been cleared and residents have been informed that investigations will be taking place with Thames Water, who manage the pipe and drain network, and Taylor Wimpey to ascertain who is responsible for the flooding and the measures needed to stop the problem from happening in the future. So far, Taylor Wimpey has denied all responsibility.

Beating the Bounds

Beating the Bounds is an ancient English custom, where community members walk the Parish perimeter to mark its boundaries, traditionally by striking boundary stones or trees with birch or willow wands. Historically it involved religious processions and fasting, often lasting several days. Fortunately the Parish Council doesn't ask residents to give up their favourite foods anymore, although it does fully encourage all to join with Charlie Nash, the Common Ranger, in an annual walk around the boundary of Colney Heath Common. As an incentive to pull on your walking boots, free tea and cakes will be served at Colney Heath Village Hall afterwards. Come along for an enjoyable time – plus you are 'bound' to learn something about the good old days of Colney Heath and life in the Parish.

A Tyttenhanger Green Walk (2.5 miles)

Tyttenhanger Green resident Kevin Brice takes us on an enjoyable walk through Parish countryside to The Plough pub and a well deserved pint.

We are blessed in our Parish to have access to the countryside through a network of footpaths. Living in Tyttenhanger Green, there are plenty of opportunities to take a dog-friendly walk. If you coincide it with the opening times at our excellent local pub, The Plough, there's an added incentive to get outside! In wet winters like the one we've had, options are more limited. At the time of writing much of Highfield Park is waterlogged and the footpaths are very muddy. In anticipation of there not being a heatwave between now and the time of publication, I have outlined a walk that tries to avoid the worst of these conditions.

Starting from Tyttenhanger Green, walk up to the junction of Highfield Lane. Here, turn left and walk a hundred yards or so to a footpath sign on the opposite side of the road to Nightingale Lane. This takes you through a pleasant wood that may be wet, but is mostly leaf mould so your boots won't get too clogged up. At the end of the wood turn left and follow the footpath which goes around the back of Highfield Farm. Soon it takes an abrupt turn to the right towards Nightingale Lane. This is flat open countryside and red kites and buzzards are often overhead looking for pickings on the arable fields (so keep your dog close). It's hard to believe that it wasn't that long ago that Nightingale Lane was open to traffic. It was blocked off in the mid 1990s when the new Highfield housing estate was built following the closure of Cell Barnes Hospital in 1988.

On reaching Nightingale Lane turn left and walk two hundred yards to a footpath sign to Highfield Lane. Go through the gap and turn right to follow the field edge round to the end of a wooded area. Unfortunately this part of the walk is close to the busy A414, but you'll soon leave the worst of the noise and walk up a delightful enclosed green lane. You might imagine a horse and carriage coming up here when it was probably a long tree lined driveway

stretching from the London Road, near to today's London Colney roundabout, up to Highfield Hall, which dates back to the 1880s.

You now reach a double bend in Highfield Lane by the Hall now converted to rather swish apartments. Charles Morris, a local businessman lived here until his death in 1926. In 1974 the Charles Morris Hall was built with finances he left to the inhabitants of Tyttenhanger Green from the sale of his land. Take care here as you go straight on, crossing the road and to your right you will see an access road to some houses and a footpath sign to Barleymow Lane (it can get a bit wetter and muddier from here on so you could shorten the walk by going back up Highfield Lane to Tyttenhanger Green). Take that path, which after a couple of hundred yards enters Knights Wood. This is especially lovely in Spring with thousands of amazing bluebells bursting into flower. Currently Herts County Council Countryside Management are doing tree works here to encourage more light to the woodland floor.

Continue through the wood to a T-junction. Turn left and go over a wooden bridge. Next, turn right and head on up to the end of the field. If you were to carry on over the next field you would come to the site of the late lamented Barley Mow pub, now a small residential development. In days of yore, you would've probably been able to walk from there, past Woodrake Cottages, through quiet countryside to Colney Heath (damn the A414!). At the end of the field, turn left and follow the field edge for a quarter of a mile to a kissing gate. Continue through the muddy middle of horse paddocks to Tyttenhanger Green where it narrows to Barleymow Lane. Turn left and you'll soon be back at your starting point. The Plough, with its welcoming fire in chilly weather and a rich history dating back to the 1880s, is there to welcome the thirsty traveller – and their dog!

A look at Colney Heath WI archives

The first committee meeting of the Colney Heath WI was held on 30th March 1953 at the home of Mrs Behling at Roestock Hall (now demolished and replaced by flats in Hall Gardens). The first WI meeting – a demonstration by the St Albans Gas Company on food preservation – was attended by 49 members at the old St Mark's Hall. 1953 was also the year of the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II and the WI assisted at the service held in the Recreation Ground, as well as at the afternoon tea party.

By 1954, the monthly meetings were being held in the Village Hall, but in 1955 a special meeting was called to discuss the Village Hall fees, which were to go up to £1 for each evening plus 5/- for use of the piano. It was agreed to pay, but not to have the piano! Talks were on a variety of subjects including the history of St Albans, cake icing, keep fit, making loose covers and a basketry demonstration. Outings were arranged to Windsor and Beaconsfield Model Village. In January 1956, committee meeting outings were cancelled indefinitely due to dissatisfaction by some members! Extra funds were raised by holding a bazaar where members sold their homemade produce. Whist drives also seemed to be a popular evening entertainment.

Today, the Colney Heath WI meets monthly. Our new Gardening Club has already been to see the snowdrops in Letchworth Garden City and we recently supplied refreshments at the Twinning Association Jumble Sale. Coming up we have talks on plague houses and pandemics, sea shanties and the power of natural skincare. We would love to welcome new members (your first visit is free!). 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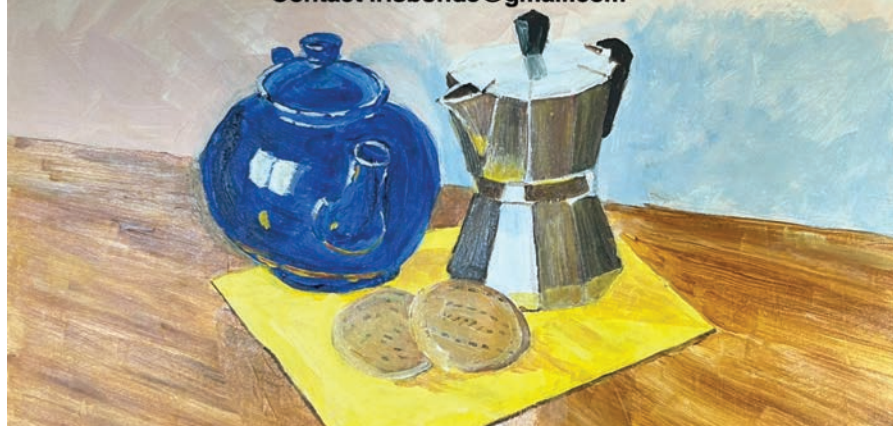

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Your Voice is given over to a person connected to the Parish to speak on a subject that others might be interested in. With Spring bringing a new flock of bird species to the Parish, Rupert Evershed, local naturalist and Chairman of Herts Bird Club, talks about one of Hertfordshire's most welcome birds and what you can do to help reverse the worrying decline in its population.



The House Martins need your help!

No, not the indie rock group, but those beautiful birds that visit us every summer from Africa. Often mistaken for Swallows, House Martins are more compact and lack the long tail of their cousins. They have a simple black on top with a bold white rump in flight. Around Colney Heath you might also see another martin – a Sand Martin – especially if you are walking around Tyttenhanger's gravel pit lakes. They love the gravel pits for the sandy cliffs they create into which they burrow their nest holes.

In contrast, House Martins love to nest in the eaves of houses. They build neat hanging mud nests (or repair if they are returning year after year) with a little hole at the top to access the feeding of their young brood. Come the end of summer, flocks of House Martins will join with Swallows on the telephone wires and eventually depart for Africa – a journey of nearly 6,000 miles. Each April, they will return to their same colonies – a sure sign that Spring has finally arrived.

Sadly, their close association with us has led to persecution. Some homeowners take umbrage at their mild disturbance and droppings below and deter the birds with nets or even destroy their nests. On a more widespread but less intentional level, modern buildings often remove eaves or board

them over. This, together with natural factors beyond our control, means that the plight of House Martins has reached crisis point with far fewer birds returning to our towns. Some traditional colonies have been abandoned altogether.

This has prompted action to see what can be done to save them and better understand the dynamics of their lifecycle. Leading the efforts is House Martin Conservation, an independent charity that aims to increase knowledge of the House Martin and create a channel for support throughout the UK and Ireland. It is making a renewed call for all nesting records of this declining species. To that end, and in partnership with Coreo (a data collection specialist), House Martin Conservation have developed the 'House Martin Mapper' app which allows you to record details of yours, or other colonies, along with a facility to record mud collecting data. Data is shared with environmental record centres and bird clubs to maximise its use for conservation and informing planning decisions and mitigation efforts.

How can you help?

1. Download the FREE app and report your House Martin sightings – especially if you are lucky enough to live in a house with a House Martin colony. To download the free app go to: housemartinconservation.com/house-martin-mapper-app

2. Become a member of House Martin Conservation. Membership is free and members will receive a welcome pack, a twice-yearly digital newsletter and will be invited to take part in charity events as the charity grows and increases activities. News update

The Ellenbrook public inquiry will open on 21 April 2026 at 10am and will last for up to four days. The first three days will be at the Fielder Centre, Hatfield Business Park, and the last day will be held at Robertson House, Six Hills Way, Stevenage. Suffice to say, this has the total attention of SSRA, the Parish Council, Ellenbrook Area Residents' Association and Hatfield Council. Other items being monitored and discussed by SSRA are:

1. The new application for 52 new houses on land at Notcutts Garden Centre (ref: 5/2025/2296) and committee members visited Glinwell Nursery to discuss its draft proposal to build a data centre and housing on the site. The data centre is proposed at 20 metres tall behind a stand of trees, while the housing sits closer to the front of the site along Station Road and Hatfield Road.

2. Updates to the Herts County Council Speed Management Strategy. Every year, HCC assess public requests against its strategy to determine new speed limits and where physical road calming measures are required. The update will use a survey on local views on current traffic, which committee members completed with a view to arrive at a situation with less local traffic, moving slower.
